PATENT NUMBERS

British patent numbers were allocated from 1617 and were numbered consecutively until 1853. Bennett Woodcroft, head of the Patents Office in the mid-19th century, drastically revised the system, for the first time introducing the requirement for proof of novelty. Pre-1852 patents can be traced through Woodcroft's **Alphabetical List Of Patentees of Inventions**.

From 1853 until 1916, numbers were allocated from No.1 every year, preceded by the year e.g. 1886/152. Unfortunately, manufacturers were adept at bending the rules. Often the year of issue was left off, meaning a very long search for a year of issue by a researcher today. References by name on makers' plates (e.g. **Smith's Patent**) often mean that a provisional patent was applied for, but that it was never granted; the only way to establish this is through the alphabetical lists of patentees, again searching year by year. To cap all of this, spurious numbers are often quoted; occasionally these 'patent' numbers are Registered Design Numbers, which can be checked against a list of these.

From the start of 1916 published patent specifications were numbered in a series starting at 100,001 in January 1916, separate from patent application numbers. The majority of patent applications filed before 1 July 1978 had been granted by the early 1980s, eventually reaching a little over 1,605,000; there are no British patent numbers between 1,610,000 and 2,000,000.

Patent applications filed after 1 July 1978 have been published with seven figure serial numbers beginning with '2'.

Patents are issued in other countries too, of course. It is possible to find a lot of these online now, particularly for the USA.

Note: After 1916 generally only granted patents were published; those not granted were never published and no information on them is now available. However following the introduction of the Patents & Designs Act 1907 (Section 91[4]), patent applications originating abroad and which claimed priority were laid open for public inspection after 12 months (later, 18 months), if not granted by then; many of the patent applications laid open were also printed and given numbers in the six-figure series – these are available. The practice of printing these foreign applications ceased during World War 11, and was abolished under the Patents Act 1949.
